



This year alone, the Westminster community raised over \$168,000, making it the largest Austin-area fundraising organization benefiting Alzheimer's.



In 2024, the Westminster Residents Association set up a matching grant to grow the Endowment Fund at Austin Community College by more than \$15,000. Our Residents Appreciation Fund (RAF) surpassed its goal of \$286,000, which affords gifts of appreciation to our 380+ associates.

Resident Profiles: Living Generously

Our residents bring their rich experiences, talents, and interests to Westminster. Together, they create extraordinary life stories.

Seeking Kindness

It all started with 50 steps down to the water to let the dock out, again. Laura and Chuck Mendenhall always knew they wanted to retire at Westminster. They started visiting their parishioners here while working as pastors in 1983. The question was not whether to move to Westminster, but when? In 2024, upkeep at their lake home prompted the decision. Chuck said, “We didn’t want to spend the next years of our life focused on tending our property.”

Their friends at Westminster had advised them to move when they could enjoy everything the community offers. The Mendenhalls came for a tour and when they saw a one-bedroom apartment with a patio for their dog, “we knew we were home,” Chuck said.

Chuck is originally from North Carolina and Laura is a native Texan. Their journey together began when they met in Richmond, Virginia, during seminary and they married in 1970. The couple have two married children, one living in Denver and the other in the Washington, DC, area, and six grandchildren.

The Mendenhalls have visited all but two states and more than 25 countries. Laura laughs, “our suitcases are in storage for now, but our door is always open to visitors.” When their children visit they stay in one of the guest apartments down the hall and their grandchildren stay with us. Spring Break will be a giant slumber party.

As soon as the Mendenhalls moved into their apartment, they embraced a daily routine. Every



morning, Chuck and Laura go to the Bistro, see friends, and bring breakfast back to their apartment. Chuck continues his woodworking in the Shop and exercises in the gym. They enjoy sculpting with clay, a new experience, as well as art, exercise, and the saline pool with a hot tub.

The Mendenhalls are also grateful for Westminster's convenient access to onsite healthcare. One day, Chuck didn't feel well. "Around lunchtime, we called the Westminster Wellness Clinic, and a nurse arrived at our door within the hour," said Laura. "A chest x-ray was taken in the apartment, and a prescription was delivered by 4:00 p.m. Soon, Chuck was feeling better, and we never had to leave the apartment. This care is unbeatable."

In their opinion, the best part of the community is the people. "It is a resident community full of deep kindness and associates with extraordinary expertise," says Laura. "The compassion and support here is priceless."

Choosing the Right Fork in the Road

Born in Memphis, Tennessee, Mary Nell Frucella received her nursing degree from Vanderbilt University and moved to Houston to work post-op care for the famous cardiovascular surgeon Dr. Michael DeBakey. She loved the job because the work was demanding and her colleagues and patients were interesting. Mary Nell later taught medical surgical nursing at Texas Women's University in Houston.

Fast forward a few years, she met her husband Jack Frucella who worked for American General Insurance in Houston. Jack was born in Buffalo, New York, and Mary Nell describes him as shrewd in business and adventuresome in spirit. In the early 1970s, they married and moved to Austin—looking for a smaller city. He founded Hill Country Life Insurance Company and began acquiring and restructuring other insurance companies.

Their eldest son, Mike, was born with physical and mental disabilities and was cared for at home and at Hope House, which Mary Nell says does God's work. They adopted son Brian and daughter Laurie. They built their forever home in Northwest Hills where they loved to entertain. They joined St. Matthew's Episcopal Church, which became their extended family since their parents and siblings lived far away. When the kids were still school-aged, Jack tragically drowned



during a kayaking trip in Mexico, leaving Mary Nell to make decisions that would shape the next chapter of her life. Mary Nell credits Jack's successor for stepping up to run the company, and her financial planner, for securing her family's financial security.

Sadly, Mary Nell suffered another loss. Son Brian died in a car wreck as a teenager. She says this is when her world went dark. Through faith, friends, and sheer will, Mary Nell decided she could cave or keep going. "Immobility is a killer. I had to keep moving," she said.

Mary Nell has also given time and treasure. After Jack's death, she built a new home and opened it to fundraisers for the arts community. For many years Mary Nell volunteered in the halls of the Brackenridge Hospital Emergency Room and served on the board of directors of the old Brackenridge and Dell Seton Medical Center. She supports Hope House and other charitable causes. More recently, she donated over 170 pieces of folk art to the Austin Friends of Folk Art, which, with the help of a curator, will archive and exhibit folk art from around the world.

Travel is part of Mary Nell's soul. Good friend and travel agent, Meta Butler Hunt, "introduced me to the third world and to folk art." She has trekked through Bhutan and Nepal, as well as Peru, among other far-flung places, traveled with duffel bags, and slept in tents. She's stayed in a treehouse and traveled up the Amazon River, all over India and Africa, to Timbuktu, Mongolia, Thailand and China, and Vietnam. Europe is nice but "the more far-flung, the better." This past month, she climbed the Great Pyramid of Giza, which she admitted made "my thighs scream." Aside from adventure, she enjoys taking art trips, especially ones organized by Karen Pope.

After living in Northwest Hills for two decades, she bought a two-story townhome in Tarrytown. Then a few years ago, a friend convinced her that Westminster should be her next stop. In 2023, she bought a unit in the Carlisle large enough to hold her curated art collection. Her interior designer was instrumental in placing furniture, choosing lighting, building

displays and cabinetry, hanging art, and finding elegant arrangements for all of it.

May Nell serves on Westminster's Welcoming Committee, plays mahjong, and attends Bible study. She also enjoys performances at Westminster and loves Conspirare and the symphony. Mary Nell admits she has two speeds, on and off, and at Westminster, she controls the switch. "Living at Westminster has brought me great peace of mind."



Generational Love and Care

Two generations of the Luellen family are residents of Westminster. Charles Luellen occupies a spacious residence in the Carlisle adorned by their collection of Southwestern art, including Texas artist Bill Worrell and renowned Austin artist Michael Frary. Charles and his late wife, Jo Sydney, adopted Santa Fe, New Mexico, as a favorite cultural destination and developed a taste for Native American art. They also collected art by Kentuckian Michael Wheeler and Mainer Ellen Church.

The Luellens spent their family years in Ashland, Kentucky. Jo Sydney wrote for the local paper, served as a community volunteer, and raised their daughters. Charles pursued a long career with Ashland Oil, Inc., starting in sales and retiring as the president and chief operating officer. Throughout his career, he traveled extensively across the United States, as well as to the Middle East, Egypt, Western and Eastern Europe, and Australia. His wife accompanied him as much as possible. He and his wife raised two daughters, Margaret and Nancy, who secured jobs in Texas. After Charles retired, the family migrated south, as well.

Charles and Jo Sydney bought a home in Austin on Monte Vista with spectacular views of Mt. Bonnell, the river and downtown. They continued to travel abroad and summered

in Bar Harbor, Maine, to escape the Texas heat.

The Luellens were on the wait list at Westminster, and when Jo Sydney got sick, the family was able to transition her to the skilled nursing wing where she was cared for 24/7 with family close by. “Westminster has been very good to our family.”

Several years after Jo Sydney died, Charles downsized and moved into a one-story home in Northwest Hills. Charles’ daughter Nancy and her husband Steve Bissell also decided to downsize and, as luck would have it, bought the house next door to her father. The families shared a fence. When Charles was ready, he decided to buy into the Carlisle while it was under construction.



Nancy and Steve met in Houston. She worked as a contract analyst for an oil transportation company and Steve as an electrical engineer at McDonnell Douglas. They moved to Austin so Steve could attend graduate school at The University of Texas and decided to stay. They raised two sons, both of whom live in Austin. Once the boys were in high school Nancy returned to work, teaching preschool at Covenant Presbyterian, their home church.

Life as empty nesters was gliding along nicely until Steve received the difficult diagnosis of early-onset Alzheimer's at age 64. He and Nancy walked the same journey with Steve's mother years earlier and understood the kind of care this medical decline would require. Steve was forced into early retirement, and, together, they planned their next steps. Last year, when it became clear Steve could no longer live safely at home, she secured a room for him in the Memory Wing of Westminster, and she took an apartment in the Preston.

Nancy says the past year has been a whirlwind – selling a home, packing for two, and moving them into separate apartments – but that Westminster has been a caring partner through all of it. Westminster provides respectful, individual care, and Nancy observes countless tender moments between associates and residents. "Any terrible diagnosis is always a shock for a family," says Nancy. "We live in the moment with Steve. Our memories of him as husband and father sustain us in our hardest times. And here he is safe, happy, and loved."

Charles, Nancy, and Steve see each other daily, and Nancy's Chihuahua, Trixie, is usually in tow. Both sons visit regularly. At

95, Charles enjoys exercising with his trainer, reads political history and biographies, and enjoys meals in the Rowan or orders in. He has dozens of friends at Westminster.

Nancy's apartment in the Preston is spacious, and she takes pride in learning her way through the community and logging 12,000 steps daily. Her hobbies include reading, crossword puzzles, cooking (maybe not so much now!), playing Rummikub, practicing Pilates, and enjoying live performances at concert venues around town. She is still very involved at Covenant and maintains the same friendships despite changing neighborhoods. Nancy's priority, though, is Steve, and making sure his needs are met. Nancy and her father may no longer share a fence, but now they share a home.






Utilizing Levels of Care

In 2012, my mother, Helen Spear, moved into a brand-new independent living apartment in the Windsor building. She thrived at Westminster and soon became involved in many activities, including helping to design and manage the library. She served as librarian and was dedicated to ensuring the library was stocked with the best titles and remained organized and accessible.

My mother chose to live in Westminster because of the continuous levels of care it provides. And, last year, after much discussion, my siblings and I moved mom into the Memory Care unit. We were pleasantly surprised by how nicely the unit was furnished and decorated. Mom made the transition well.

A few months later, mom spent time in the hospital and those five days set her back in terms of her strength, independence, and cognitive abilities. Again, utilizing the inclusive levels of care at Westminster, mom was discharged from the hospital to Westminster's skilled nursing unit. While in the skilled nursing unit, she was evaluated for hospice which works seamlessly with associates at Westminster.

With the help of our private caregivers and her own determination, mom was able to return to her room in Memory Care where the associates welcomed her warmly. Mom is doing so well that she may get "kicked out" of hospice soon.



At 97, mom still retains her sense of humor and her good-natured spirit. My brother, two sisters and I are thankful that mom chose to move to Westminster while in her 80s and that all of us became part of the Westminster story.
